
U.S. FISH & WILDLIFE SERVICE CAREER ANNOUNCEMENT

Permanent and Term Maintenance Workers and Engineering Equipment Operators Announced! Application Deadline September 3rd.

The U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service (FWS) has announced more than 35 Maintenance Workers and Engineering Equipment Operators across the United States.

Positions are in Alabama, Alaska, California, Florida, Hawai'i, Louisiana, Maryland, Minnesota, New Hampshire, New Jersey, North Carolina, North Dakota, Oklahoma, Oregon, South Carolina, South Dakota, Utah, and Washington.

Position Details

[Maintenance Mechanics](#) and [Engineering Equipment Operators](#) make up a significant portion of the FWS workforce. These currently advertised positions work at National Wildlife Refuges and will travel frequently to support infrastructure projects throughout the United States.



- You will be part of a large mobile workforce which tackles priority construction, demolition, and maintenance projects.
- Work as part of diverse teams alongside local refuge staff.
- Use a variety of light and heavy equipment ranging from skidsteers to large bulldozers and earthmovers.
- Travel to a diverse set of projects including levee repair, HVAC or plumbing maintenance, facility demolition, culvert or water control structure replacement, and small building construction.
- Be provided with high quality training, and mentor other employees in skilled trades.

APPLICATION TIP: Federal Resume Considerations

For more information about the federal hiring process including instructional videos, visit www.usajobs.gov/help/faq. Here are some considerations:

1. You should include all your relevant experience on your resume, which includes volunteer and unpaid experience, student organization participation, certifications, leadership opportunities, etc.
2. Federal resumes have no page limits.
3. Do not assume a simple, summary statement of your duties on your resume will be interpreted to include smaller-scale tasks. Provide the relevant details about your duties.
4. Resumes must contain job title (include job series and grade, if federal), duties, starting and ending dates (month and year), hours worked per week, and salary.
5. Vacancy announcements include a link to an application questionnaire that an applicant will complete after submitting their resume and other application documents. You can view this questionnaire via the provided link in the vacancy announcement. Ensure that any experience you have is reflected in your resume.
